Romance Scams

Know the facts and how to avoid becoming a victim

- In 2023, the National Fraud Investigation Bureau (NFIB), run by the City of London Police received 8,792 reports of romance fraud in the UK.
- Losses reported by victims to NFIB in 2023 totaled over £94.7million. The average loss per person was £10,774.
- The top five platforms victims report speaking to scammers on are; Facebook, Plenty of Fish, Instagram, Tinder and Match.com.
- In 2023 the Public Protection Partnership Trading Standards service supported a victim who lost £900,000 to a romance scammer.
- The scammer will often state they are overseas, on business, in the military or working on an oil rig.
- The relationship gets very serious, very quickly and the scammer may profess their love at an early stage.
- The scammer will take advantage of the emotional attachment that has been struck up and invent a reason to ask the individual for financial help. This could be for an operation or medical expenses, or to get a passport and plane tickets to visit you.
- Secrecy is important, the scammer will tell the individual to keep them a secret and may try and turn the person against their family.
- Check the person is genuine by searching for their name in a search engine such as Google <u>www.google.co.uk.</u>
- Include 'catfish', 'romance fraud' and 'dating scam' in the search.
- Do a reverse search of the person's image to see if it is genuine. The images of the individual will often have been used on multiple occasions.
- Never send money or give bank or personal details to anyone you have met online.
- Don't rush into anything, ask lots of questions, get to know the person.
- Scammers will often repeat themselves, so they make themselves suspicious, try to listen out for and notice those suspicions.
- Speak to a friend or family member to see what they think and be very wary of anyone you meet online asking you to keep them a secret.
- If you become a victim of a romance scam, don't be embarrassed, report it to Action Fraud on <u>www.actionfraud.police.uk</u> or on 0300 1232040.
